


# What's New for Fort Selkirk?

# **BEHIND THE SCENES**

2019 marked the 32<sup>nd</sup> year of a joint project by the Selkirk First Nation (SFN) and Yukon governments, to preserve, protect and interpret the co-owned and co-managed Fort Selkirk Historic Site. All of the planning and activities undertaken at Fort Selkirk are guided by the Fort Selkirk Management Plan, Preservation Plan and Interpretation Plan. These plans have been developed co-operatively by both governments to ensure the mandate for site conservation and management are protecting its heritage values as outlined in the SFN Final

Agreement and the *Historic Resources Act*. The implementation of these plans and overall management of the site is overseen by the Fort Selkirk Management Committee. The Fort Selkirk Management Committee is composed of an equal number of members from the Selkirk First Nation and Government of Yukon.

Selkirk First Nation values of caring, sharing, respecting and teaching are practiced at Fort Selkirk; therefore, there are no alcohol or drugs at the Fort Selkirk Historic Site.



# FORT SELKIRK STAFF TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

#### **Log Building Conservation Training**

For the past number of years, Yukon government (YG), in partnership with Selkirk First Nation, have held a week-long log building conservation course at Fort Selkirk. Courses took place in 2006, 2015, 2017 and 2018. In summer 2019 the training was offered again, but unfortunately the timing didn't fit with Fort Selkirk staff schedules and no one was able to attend. The training may be offered again during the 2020 season.

Log building conservation training has also occurred at Forty Mile, Robinson Roadhouse and in Old Crow.

The course focuses on developing log restoration skills through the hands-on training. It is taught by restoration expert Peter Caron, with additional course support from YG and First Nations staff.

# **WORK CAMP MAINTENANCE & IMPROVEMENTS**

Each year, the Management Committee develops a work plan for the site that guides the care and maintenance of Fort Selkirk. The work plan is flexible and can be adapted to allow for new priorities. It may be revised during the season to accommodate changes in restoration priorities, as determined by the Management Committee and the site supervisor, or when interrupted by a forest fire, or other natural events. Seasonal work planning is completed using the Fort Selkirk Management and Interpretive Plans as guiding documents.

Summary of work that took place in 2019:

#### Larsen/Lankins Cabin

Cleared poplars and spruce trees on the river side of the cabin. Removed debris and cleaned the cabin's interior. Repairs were made to the main door, porch door, foundation, and eavestrough.

#### **Devore Cabin**

Fixed roofing detail around the chimney. Built and installed wooden foundation vents with pest-proof mesh. Checked the grade around building to ensure the slope is adequate to shed runoff rainwater away from the building. Repairs made to the cabin include removal of damaged awning, window re-glazing, repair and replacement of a broken sash.

## **New Stairway**

A new stairway was installed on the riverbank for river travelers and visitors to access the site.

## **Stone House Repairs**

Cleaned and re-glazed windows, removed and repaired broken window panes on the east side. Repaired the extension ladder. Some progress was made on roof repairs with the continued removal of the old shingles and installation of temporary tarps to protect the roof over the winter. Replacement of roof shingles is a priority for the 2020 season.

## Parks Day 2019

A tradition at the Fort Selkirk Historic Site is to host an open house on Parks Day. Canada's Parks Day is an annual event promoting the importance of Parks and Historic Sites. Hundreds of sites across the country host special events and activities on this day.
